CANDIDATE STATEMENTS

Stephen Dudderidge, Registrar & Secretary, University of Brighton

The current period is likely to prove career-defining for most of us in university leadership roles, yet many of the challenges we now face pre-date the pandemic. And in a world of increasing regulation, market



competition and changing international circumstances our sector remains on the back-foot when seeking to position itself once again as an unambiguous 'good' for our society.


